GROUP LEADER'S NOTES - STUDY 10

QUESTION 1

- a) To the casual onlooker, what we have here are a series of random events.
- b) However, what we have here is a seamless advance of God's plan to save a nation through which the whole world will be blessed.
- c) "What the family didn't know was that God had been at work over the past twenty years setting things up just so that they would be saved from death" (Liam Goligher).
- d) This is a reminder that God has everything under control. Note what He told Abraham back in **Genesis 15:13-15**.
- e) Verse 57 of the previous chapter shows the extent of the famine; but also, the importance of where Joseph now finds himself. Things have been leading up to this. Everything points to Egypt and to Joseph.
- f) To Jacob, Egypt was just a country that might help them. To the brothers, it was a reminder of their guilt. For it was to traders heading to Egypt that they had sold their brother; before claiming to their father that he had been killed by a wild animal.
- g) We see something of this dilemma for them in verse 1 when their father asks: "Why do you look at one another?"

QUESTION 2

- a) This wasn't to do with Benjamin being too young. He would have been in his twenties by now.
- b) Jacob had already lost one of the two sons he had with his Rachel; the one he truly loved. He doesn't want to lose the other son. Has he not yet lost that favouritism streak of his?
- c) We also sense an element of mistrust directed at the other sons.
- d) Verse 4 is certainly a reminder of the lie in which the family were still living.

QUESTION 3

- a) This is the first mention of 'Israel' in connection with these brothers.
- b) This was the name given to Jacob; the name of the nation which God was building (**Genesis 35:10-11**).
- c) Here we see God's covenant plan unfolding.

QUESTION 4

- a) When he saw his brothers, he must have immediately realised that the revelation God had given him twenty years earlier was coming to fulfilment.
- b) The other dreams he had interpreted for Pharaoh, the chief cupbearer and the chief baker had come to pass. So now were his own.
- c) The brothers' arrival in Egypt is no coincidence. It is the hand of God.
- d) Joseph has begun to see why God had allowed him to be in this position; with all that he had experienced leading up to this time.

QUESTION 5

- a) Their claim to honesty shows that they have conveniently forgotten what they did with Joseph.
- b) They almost believe their own lie.
- c) When they say that their brother is no more; are they assuming that he is dead, or that he is no longer a legitimate part of the family?
- d) It suggests that they really haven't changed.

QUESTION 6

- a) Twenty years on; dressed as an Egyptian; and without a beard, the seventeen-year-old of chapter 37 would have looked very different.
- b) And of course, the brothers would not have expected to have seen him in this context.
- c) Notice in verse 6 that they bowed down with their faces to the ground. This was the custom of the day when coming before someone of important status. In this case; their lives depended on him.
- d) Joseph's response to his brothers is not out of malice or revenge. It is to see whether they have come to repentance. Whether they have really changed.
- e) What is important is a right relationship with God; not just physical food.
- f) God is using Joseph to bring them to that repentance and a change of heart and mind.
- g) This only comes when there is a recognition of guilt.
